The sole purpose of this risk assessment is to support schools in preparing for the possibility of providing some face-to-face contact with pupils in year groups Nursery, Reception, Year 1 and 6 **while reducing the risk of coronavirus transmission**. The risk assessment has been written in collaboration with a number of local authorities.

- For the purpose of this risk assessment, the term ‘coronavirus’ to refer to coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19).
- Schools must ensure that this risk assessment reflects the local setting and context of the school. Staff must be consulted with regard to this risk assessment.
- This risk assessment is not exhaustive and some of the controls will be dynamic.
- This document should be read in conjunction with the school specific Covid-19 Opening Process and communicated to staff via a tool box talk.
- This should be viewed alongside relevant advice and guidance from the Department of Education and reflect any additional subsequent guidance issued to schools.
